THE PASTOR'S PAGE



There's an old saying: "It's always the darkest just before the dawn." That was certainly true on the first Easter morning. Try to envision how dark Palestine was without electric lights. Try to imagine how dark the Garden of Gethsemane—Israel's ancient cemetery—was

just before dawn the Sunday morning after Christ's crucifixion. But even darker than the night was the spiritual darkness in the hearts and minds of Jesus' disciples.

To fully appreciate the nature of the Easter faith we Christians proclaim in this Easter season, we must first be able to comprehend the awful reality of spiritual darkness—life without the light of Christ. We can only fully appreciate the joy of Easter if we have first understood the defeated spirit of the people who went to the tomb that Sunday morning 2,000 years ago. Until the risen Christ made himself known to them, their mood was one of darkest despair. The one in whom they had put all of their hope and trust had been arrested only three days earlier. He had been tried, convicted, tortured, and crucified. His mangled body had been laid in a cold, dark tomb, and a huge stone had been placed over the entrance and sealed with mortar by Roman soldiers. Jesus' disciples had come to believe that he was the Messiah, the King of Israel. In the last few weeks, Jesus had raised their hopes and expectations for the imminent arrival of the Kingdom of God. But now, with his crucifixion and burial, the light and hope that Jesus had given them had been snuffed out like a dimly burning wick.

And that is surely the way it is for all who do not have the hope of eternal life in their hearts. Without the knowledge of Christ's resurrection and his promise of new life for all believe, life must often feel dark and gloomy, especially when tragedy and despair come into our lives. Without the hope born of Jesus' resurrection, what looms ahead of us when life nears its end but utter darkness?

What a difference our faith in Christ's resurrection makes! Thanks to Christ's resurrection, the grave has lost all of its darkness and dread. We need no longer be in despair in the face of death. For the light of Christ has illumined the dark shadows of every graveyard. For the disciples on that first Easter morning, and for all who believed their testimony, life would never be dark again. For Christ has gone ahead of us through the grave and gateway of death and vanquished the darkness of death forever.

The Good News of Easter is that Jesus, who went ahead of us to the grave, continues to walk ahead of us every day of our lives illuminating our path. The women at the tomb were told by the angel that Jesus would go

ahead of them to Galilee (Matthew 28). Galilee was their home, the home of all the disciples. And perhaps the angel's statement is symbolic of how Christ is leading us all to our true spiritual home.

But then, we have a God who has always gone ahead of us leading the way. When Moses led the people out of Egypt, the Lord went ahead of them into the darkness of the wilderness, as a pillar of fire by night. When the Israelites were struggling to establish a foothold in the Promised Land, the Ark of the Covenant—a symbol of God's presence in their midst—would always go ahead of them into battle. And when the women, filled with fear and dread, came in the darkness to the tomb, God had already gone ahead of them and rolled away the stone.

God has gone ahead of us and led us every step of the way ever since the day of creation. And God, in Jesus Christ, willingly went ahead of us to the cross and grave. If God went ahead of us to face the pain, suffering, and death of the cross, then how can we ever doubt that God will not indeed go ahead of us wherever life leads? The Good News of Easter is that the light of Christ is always going ahead of us illuminating the darkness. The light of dawn on that first Easter morning revealed for all to see that there is no place we can go in life where we won't find that God has already gone ahead of us and illumined the path forward.

It *is* always darkest just before the dawn. But now the Son has risen! And for all who have faith in Him darkness is dispelled forever.

CHURCH BOARD MEETING

February 22, 2022

- Current numbers for COVID receded to a level where we can unmask.
 The task force recommended and the board approved going back to a more normal worship service. We will continue with the communion prepackaged cups in March and then transition to continuous communion via intinction. Refreshments can once again be served.
- 2. The History of Zion's Union Church is nearing completion. Rev. Heckler compiled and wrote much of the history with Rev Butz completing the work. Pastor Jeff is waiting for the completion of the organ restoration so it can be included in the history.
- 3. Bulletins will be mailed to the shut-in members.
- 4. Two of the flags waving out in front of the church have flown away in the last few weeks. One was found and one flew away. We will remove the remaining flags for the duration of the winter. Do you like the flags or are then not important to you? Let a board member know your opinion.
- 5. Total damage cost from the lightning storm is \$35,767.47. Insurance reimbursement is still in the works and we expect to get all but the deductible reimbursed.
- 6. Every Daylight Savings change is designated as an opportunity to raise awareness and funds for the Helping Hands Fund. Baskets will be ready on March 13th for your donations.
- 7. The Youth Group is searching for new leaders. Prayerfully consider filling this role.
- 8. The Sunday School is bringing back the Strawberry and Ice Cream Festival the first Friday in June. Also planned is the Sunday School Picnic and Rally Day on the last Sunday in August.

GERMAN AND ENGLISH BOOK PUBLISHED

Mary Laub published another bilingual book, *Uff der Bauerei: In em Baamgaarde* (On the Farm: In the Orchard) which is the 5th in the Uff der Bauerei series. This story continues with Henny, die Katz (the cat) and Spunky, der Hund (the dog). When Frank, the owner of the farm goes to the orchard, Henny and Spunky go with him. They are



enjoying themselves until they hear Frank scream. What happened? Why can't he move? Once again Henny and Spunky prove to be helpful and actually are able to help others, too.

Book 5 has an expanded Glossary with page numbers to easily locate words within the story. There is also a Reference Section. As in previous books, the story is written in PA German with a phonetic spelling and an English translation underneath. An illustration matches the text and there is an audio recording of the story which can be downloaded for free or a CD can be purchased separately. Books and CDs can be purchased from Mary, at Dietrich's Meats (they also sell the CDs), Leid's Saddlery, Wooden Bridge Dry Goods, and Burkholder's Farm Market on Topton Road or online at Amazon.com and Masthof.com. Books are \$10 and CDs are \$5.

Easter 2022 - No Idle Tale

"I love to tell the story..." So goes the great old hymn. But the world is filled with stories today, that are tough to tell. As Covid lingers. As the war in Ukraine breaks our heart. What's next? And will it be worse? Just as much, I worry: can we trust each other anymore? Trust enough to share any kind of news, and believe it, together? Do we still hold in common, any of the assumptions, beliefs, and causes we used to share? Or is our world now filled only with suspicions and deceptions — "fake news" from all sources, on all sides?

On that first Easter Sunday, still overshadowed by Good Friday, bleakness and distrust were also all around. Even when those energized, overjoyed women burst in, announcing the most amazing thing they had ever seen and heard – HIS TOMB IS EMPTY! JESUS IS RISEN! – even then, "all the rest" dismissed their report as nothing more than "an idle tale" (Luke 24:11).

We are the church. We are called to be different. If the prevailing winds of our world today are seeking to blow us apart, the Holy Spirit winds us back together. God calls us to come to the places of sadness and sickness and doubt and despair — where all hope is dead and buried — and be ready to be amazed. Ready to see (and say!) what was dead — is now ALIVE. What was lost — is now FOUND. What was impossible — is now POSSIBLE. Real. True. And trustworthy. Jesus is risen, and we shall arise. The Bible prophets foretold it. Jesus said it, again and again. But almost nobody could trust it. Until God made it true, and sent people out to spread the word, the good news, the gospel. God is still sending us today. This Easter Sunday is like the first: a world full of doubt and distrust. A world full of conflict and separation. In the midst of it all, Christ is standing here with us. The Holy Spirit is in us and giving us courage. And God is making all things new, even now.

Jesus is risen, and we shall arise. Let us share this good news, for ALL people, for ALL creation. Holy God, give us the power to trust it, and to share it. Rebuild in us: trust in you. And through us: rebuild trust throughout our world, with justice, with peace, with faith, hope and love.

MISSION MOMENT

Into Jerusalem

Accompany Jesus on his Holy Week journey. Take time to read the scripture and pray each day of this sacred time.

Sunday, April 10 Jesus enters the city of Jerusalem during the festival of Passover. Read Luke 19:28-40. Jesus asked the disciples to go and find a colt for him to ride. That must have seemed like a strange request, but they did it anyway. What strange thing is Jesus asking of you? How might you respond?

Monday, April 11 Jesus enters the temple and clears out the signs of commerce. Read Luke 19:45-46. Jesus drove the people who were exploiting the poor out of the temple. Who is being exploited today? How might Jesus respond? How might we?

Tuesday, April 12 Jesus teaches that "the stone the builder rejected will be the cornerstone." Read Luke 19:47-20:19. This passage is imbued with menace, as the political and religious leaders of Jesus' days seek a way to punish him. Why was his message so threatening to those in power in Jesus' day? Why is it so threatening today?

Wednesday, April 13 Jesus continues to teach those gathered in Jerusalem. Read Luke 21. This teaching begins when Jesus observes the difference between the wealthy and the impoverished. What differences do you think Jesus would notice now? What differences do you notice? What stories will grow from noticing these differences?

Thursday, April 14 The celebration of the Passover is followed by arrest and betrayal. Read Luke 22:1-62. You hear these words when we celebrate communion together. Read them now and listen for what is new or challenging in this message. What does communion mean to you? How do you acknowledge or celebrate that meaning?

Friday, April 15 Good Friday. Jesus is crucified.

Read Luke 23. Jesus is executed in a state-sanctioned act of violence. Even in his final moments of suffering, Jesus promises forgiveness and eternal life to those crucified near him. What places of suffering need to hear Christ's voice? In your own life? In your region? In the world?

Saturday, April 16 Holy Saturday. Jesus lies in the tomb.

Scripture says nothing about what Jesus did on this day and there is no scripture reading for this day. In your prayer time, light a single candle, and meditate on the illumination cast by even one small flame. How has God been steadfast, even in times of seeming absence?
