CHRISTMAS IS COMING!!!!

When our two children were little, Kathy and I tried to shield them from the excess of the cultural, materialistic, and market-driven holiday that Christmas

has become in our world today. We wanted them to understand that Christmas was about the birth of Jesus and God's love; it had nothing to do with Rudolph, Frosty, Charlie Brown, and Snoopy, and a Santa Claus who brings gifts and toys in direct correlation to a child's behavior throughout the year. Frankly, we failed miserably!

In a book called *Christmas: Festival of Incarnation*, author Donald Heinz notes that Christians have always lamented the "cultural captivity" of Christmas. From the beginning, Christians have tried to separate themselves from the more over-the-top secular celebration of Christmas. But, says Heinz, it's been a "spectacular failure of theological imagination." What he means is that the church's emphasis on observing the true meaning of Christmas has always lost out to the secular world's celebration of Christmas when it comes to capturing our children's imagination (and most adults as well!).

But, frankly, Christmas is a newcomer on the scene. Long before the beginning of Christianity, the winter solstice was an occasion of thanksgiving and celebration. The darkness and cold of the retreating sun inspired terror, and when the sun finally started its slow return, ancient peoples marked the event with feasting and fertility celebrations. And some of their symbols are still with us: boughs of evergreen, holly and ivy, and wreaths.

Later, the Romans would mark the year's end with a festival called Saturnalia, a raucous weeklong party. Christians decided to offer an alternative and began to celebrate the incarnation with a special service called "Christ's Mass." Their hope was that in time Christ's Mass would replace Saturnalia. That effort failed, Heinz notes, as has every effort of the church to banish the secular year-end solstice festival.

And nobody but nobody was as hard on Christmas as the Puritans when they came to the new world. Heinz says, "They argued that December 25th was not biblical but heathen, that Jesus would have disapproved of his birthday celebrations, and that Christmas was just an excuse for . . . gross behavior, social upheaval, and drunkenness, no doubt aided by the lull in agricultural life." The Puritans ordered shops to stay open, insisted that work go on as usual, and banned holiday celebrations. They also managed to have Christmas declared illegal by the Massachusetts legislature from 1659 to 1681. Heinz reports that the U.S. Congress even remained in session on Christmas Day from 1789 to 1851.

The Puritans did a lot of good things, but banning Christmas because of eating, drinking, and celebrating, was not one of their more memorable ideas. After all, the incarnation of God—which is the real meaning of Christmas—means that this world is God's creation and that God loved it so much that God came here to be in it with us. The Christmas story could not be more thisworldly: a pregnant unwed teenager, a perplexed fiancé, an arduous journey, an inn full of raucous guests, a barn full of animals, labor pains, blood, birth, and umbilical cords.

The origin of Christmas could not be more human or more earthy; and that is the point. Incarnation means that God is with us in this world, the sacred in the secular, the holy in the profane. It is *this* world that God entered into on that first Christmas. And he has been here with us in the midst of all our earthly doings ever since. The fact is that Jesus partied and celebrated while he was on earth, so there is no reason that we shouldn't celebrate his coming into the world with great good cheer.

We Love... 2019 A Day of Learning



We Love...because God first loves us. We Love...others because each person is a child of God. We Love...by expanding our understanding of others and allowing people to be truly who God made them to be. We Love...because God is love.

These were just a few of the takeaways from We Love... 2019, a day of learning to help congregations be more opening and welcoming to LGBTQIA+ individuals and their families. For many participants this was uncharted territory, as they are learning what all those letters actually do mean (Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, Queer/Questioning, Intersex, Asexual/Aromantic plus many more).



For others, there was still plenty to learn as we explored the intersection between sexuality/gender identity and faith and discussed how the church can be a place where people do not feel they have to hide their sexuality or gender identity in order to feel the love of God and others.



The keynote speaker was Jamie Bruesehoff, a writer and advocate in New Jersey. She is married to an ELCA pastor and is the mother of three children, the oldest of whom is transgender. Workshops included safety basics, welcoming language in worship, what scripture has to say about homosexuality, bisexuality visibility, and parents sharing stories of when their children came out and how the church was both helpful and hurtful.

We Love... is being planned again for the fall of 2020.

The day the final total was calculated, we received a letter encouraging us to participate in the ELCA World Hunger appeal and take advantage of the matching funds currently available. Breaking bread, eradicating hate



uch can happen when we gather for a meal — new understandings, new commitments, new friendships.

In May 2018, several ELCA congregations and worshiping communities discovered this when they joined their Muslim neighbors for interfaith iftars.

An iftar is the meal for which Muslims break their daily fast during the holy month of Ramadan.

Augustana Lutheran, Sioux Falls, S.D., and the mission congregation it shares building space with, Pueblo de Dios, hosted their first iftar. Almost 60 people attended, including members of Augustana Lutheran and Pueblo de Dios and Muslims from three mosques in town.

"There was a bit of discomfort on both sides — Christian and Muslim," said Amy Martinell, Augustana's pastor. But "when the food came out and we sat and ate together, the discomfort melted away and we became one community."

For two years the Lutheran School of Theology at Chicago (LSTC) hosted regular iftars with a nearby Turkish community. Sara Trumm, interim director of A Center of Christian-Muslim Engagement for Peace and Justice at LSTC, reported that 60 to 100 people attended. Trumm said they've found that sharing a meal helps people feel comfortable meeting others from different backgrounds.

'Right now, with Islamophobia as strong as it is, it's important for people to be informed about what



Islam is so they don't fall prey to some of the negative stereotyping and falsities being shared, especially with one of the Ten Commandments telling us to not bear false witness against our neighbors," she said.

To promote the interfaith iftars, Neighbors in Faith, a joint ministry of the Northwest Washington Synod of the ELCA, the Episcopal Diocese of Olympia and Washington's Muslim community, worked with Shoulder-to-Shoulder, an interreligious campaign dedicated to ending anti-Muslim sentiment. The ELCA is a founding member of Shoulder-to-Shoulder, which receives Mission Support funding.

"What actually changes for people who are rooted in fear is to meet a Muslim and realize they're just human too," said Terry Kyllo, an ELCA pastor and the director of Neighbors in Faith. "The iftars are a beautiful way to begin to understand the basics of Islam and how many similarities we have. And they help our Muslim neighbors to see that they aren't alone, that we want to learn from them and are willing to stand in solidarity with them."
