## THE PASTOR'S PAGE



You've seen it on signs at football games, on T-shirts, even on quarterback Tim Tebow's eyeblack: John 3:16. The most famous verse in the Bible, the one called the gospel in a nutshell: "For God so loved the world that he gave his only

Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life." Christian author Max Lucado calls this verse, "An alphabet of grace, a table of contents to Christian hope, each word a safe-deposit box of jewels." John 3:16 is extremely precious stuff, no doubt about it.

So why is such a treasure put on the bottom of shopping bags? At a clothing store called Forever 21, frequented mainly by teenage girls, John 3:16 is discreetly printed on the bottom of the store's bags! The Forever 21 chain says that the inscription on every bag is, "a demonstration of the owners' faith." Forever 21 is not alone. A number of companies owned by Christians are attaching the gospel message to their products. The California hamburger chain called "In-N-Out Burger" prints John 3:16 on its drink cups. Its burger bags say Nahum 1:7, and its fry bags say Revelation 3:20. At the In-N-Out Burger, a single meal can take you on a quick tour through the Bible!

And then there's a Christian footwear company called The Shoes of the Fisherman. Their motto is "my soles magnify the Lord" and one of their bestsellers is "Jesus Loves You" flip-flops. Put on a pair and walk down the beach and everywhere you walk, "Jesus loves you" will be imprinted on the sand! The word "Jesus" is embossed on the sole of the left foot, and "Loves You" on the right. These are ideal for those folks who really want to witness to their faith, but can't overcome their fear of talking to strangers.

But one has to ask, do these witnessing methods really bring anyone to the Lord? I would like to think that these efforts at least make people curious enough to open their Bible and read the verse. But maybe using the Bible this way is only the equivalent of In-N-Out fast-food scripture. If we're honest, just reading a single Bible verse isn't going to do it. Hearing the Word alone doesn't cut it. In my favorite book of the Bible, the Letter of James, Jesus' own brother says, "Be doers of the word, and not merely hearers" (James 1:22). Maybe I need to get that printed on a T-shirt!

Anyway, I give props to all these companies and to anyone who holds up a John 3:16 sign at a ball game as a way of getting the message out. But, at the same time, the next step has to be taken: *sacrifice*. "For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son." God did not so love the world that he sent a flowery note; no, he *gave* his only Son. That's a true sacrifice, a sacrifice that has an impact.

Everyone knows that actions speak much louder than words. That's

why the sacrifice of God's Son still continues to resonate so loudly throughout the world after 2,000 years. And that's why when you walk past a Chick-fil-A restaurant on Sunday, you can see that the owner of that chain is not merely a hearer but a doer of the Word. It's one of the only stores you'll find closed on a Sunday. According to its website, the Chick-fil-A founder made the decision to close on Sundays in 1946 because he believed that all Chick-fil-A operators and employees "should have an opportunity to rest, spend time with family and friends, and worship if they choose to do so." That's a real sacrifice that surely hurts their bottom-line.

So, what are we willing to sacrifice in order to be doers of the Word? We might sacrifice a portion of our Sunday morning to the students in a Sunday School class. We might give a couple hours a week to serve the poor and homeless at a soup kitchen. We might give time to an underprivileged child by being a big brother or sister. We might give up a week's vacation to help with a mission. We might give a percentage of our income to support God's work in the world. How each Christian becomes a doer rather than just a hearer is different. But however you choose to sacrifice, it will demonstrate that you are not just an "In-N-Out" Christian, but an "all-in" Christian.

Here's the tricky part about being a disciple of Jesus. It cannot be "In-N-Out" — in at 10:00 on Sunday morning and out at 11. If we truly have faith in the sacrifice of Jesus, we need to go "all-in" and bet everything we've got. Think about it: If you trust a person just a little bit, you may as well not trust them at all. Would you jump out of an airplane with just a little bit of trust in your parachute? I don't think so!

People who truly trust in Jesus will organize their entire lives around him. That's why Sierra Trading Post prints a bold mission statement in its catalogs: "Our business ethics must be consistent with the faith of the owners in Jesus Christ and His teachings. We invite you to write our founder and president, Keith Richardson, if what we do does not match what we believe." Richardson says that the purpose of this is not to proselytize, it is to hold himself and his company accountable. If they're not treating customers the way they would want to be treated, let them know.

Companies such a Sierra Trading Post and Chick-fil-A are not alone. Tom's of Maine uses spiritual practices to run the company and is committed to environmentalism. Tyson Foods employs a team of chaplains to minister to its employees and recently funded a "Center for Faith and Spirituality in the Workplace" at the University of Arkansas. Those who own and operate these companies are obviously not merely hearers, but doers of the Word. That's "all-in" Christianity.

In this new year, may all of us at Zion's Union Church go all-in for Christ!

## SECOND PENNSYLVANIA GERMAN BOOK PUBLISHED!

Learn PA German (Dutch)! Mary Laub has published a second picture book, *Uff der Bauerei: Wu iss die Henny? (On the Farm: Where is Henny?)* which is a bi-lingual book written in Pennsylvania German (Dutch). This book is a sequel to the first book published, *Uff der Bauerei: Die Henny un der Spunky (On the Farm: Henny and Spunky).* The stories are uniquely different in that there is a phonetic spelling written in parenthesis under each word to facilitate pronunciation. ## Filled with the Malagasy spirit

On her first night in Fianarantsoa, Madagascar, Minnesota native Erika Storvick felt overwhelmed by her decision to serve there through the ELCA's Young Adults in Global Mission (YAGM) program.

'It's probably the place that is most different from Minnesota," she said of Madagascar.

Through YAGM, Storvick answered a call to spend a year volunteering alongside Malagasy companions teaching English to primary, secondary and deaf students, and growing in faith. But that night she asked herself, "Why have I chosen to live on the other side of the world for an entire year?"

Though she didn't have an answer at the time, Storvick knows now that the experience helped her become more open-minded.

While teaching was fulfilling, the Malagasy spirit—being intentional with others, to the point where time and schedules take a back seat as one focuses on relationships—really filled her heart.

"I was a very overscheduled, overinvolved person before, so at first, my life felt empty if I didn't have something scheduled for every minute of every day," she said. "[But] you have so many more opportunities to grow if you don't schedule every minute."



The challenges of living alone, walking an hour one-way to the deaf school where she taught arts and crafts, and overcoming a language barrier were at times daunting, Storvick said.

But she stuck with it, said Kirsten Laderach, an ELCA pastor and YAGM country coordinator for Madagascar. Laderach's work with YAGM is primarily funded through Mission Support.

"She ... Just kept doing the work that you do when life's not easy, which I really appreciate about her," Laderach said.

Storvick said the community spirit she was shown by people she met helped make her year abroad one of lasting importance.

"I think I'm a better person because I did YAGM," she said. "It's taught me that [from] the places and people I least expect, you can grow friendships, and even in very humbling situations ... [when] you know nothing or none of the answers—those are the places I saw God." Volume 27, Issue 1
