THE PASTOR'S PAGE



In last month's Pastor's Page, I promised to update everyone about our plans for re-opening our church and having in-person worship services again. At its last meeting, our Church Board made the

decision to comply with the directives of both the Bishop of the Northeast Pennsylvania Synod of the ELCA and the Conference Minister of the Penn Southeast Conference of the United Church of Christ, that we should not open our doors until our county is safely in the green phase for business and church re-openings. When our congregation does resume public activities, please know that we will do so through a careful process of discernment, with an abundance of caution and concern for those who are most vulnerable, upon consideration of the best scientific knowledge at our disposal, in accordance with all legal/governmental guidelines, and in the spirit of constant prayer and trust in God's guidance.

To that end, at its last meeting our Church Board voted to convene what we are calling the "Church Re-opening Task Force." We have now done that, and I am quite happy to announce that we have assembled a crack team of people from the Safety and Disaster committees as well as other pertinent people to devise our guidelines and procedures for re-opening. They are:

Dr. Kevin Krause (Safety and Disaster Committees), Kay Weidner (nurse), Diane Herber (nurse), Lori Arndt (chair, Safety Committee), Sherie Mohn (Safety and Disaster Comms. and technician at Lehigh Valley Hospital), Pat Kutz (Disaster Committee and Red Cross volunteer), Tim Haas (Worship & Music Comm.), Mandy Graff (Board liaison), Jim Laub (Board liaison), Diana Gehman (Sexton).

The task force met for the first time on June 15th and discussed a whole range of issues we will have to face as we re-open. Many issues are still being researched, but I can share with you the decisions that we have already reached. Please know that these decisions are being made first and foremost to protect everyone, but especially those who are most at-risk. Obviously, the last thing we want is for anyone to contract the virus in church, which could result in our having to close our doors again. Here are the policies the Task Force has already decided to put in place:

- Sunday School will not resume until at least September.
- No committees, organizations, or groups will be allowed to meet in the building until at least September.

- All pew cushions, hymnals, and paper will be removed from the pews (worshipers are invited to bring their own cushions/pillows).
- Ushers will direct you where to sit beginning in the front of the sanctuary. Every other pew will be empty (please be prepared that you will not sit in your usual spot). Families may sit together, but sixfoot distance will be maintained between families and individuals.
- Everyone will be required to wear a mask.
- You will be ushered out at the end of the service beginning in the rear
 of the sanctuary.
- While the organ and piano will be played, and one or two choir members will sing, hymns will not be sung by the worshipers, but you are invited to hum along (singing is one of the most flagrant ways to disperse aerosol droplets into the air).
- No children's sermons will be done for a while.
- Offering plates will not be passed but will be stationed in the narthex for offering to be deposited. Cash should be placed in envelopes.
- Bulletins will be pre-placed in the pews and all hymns will be printed in the bulletin.
- Communion will be done single file at the altar rail maintaining six feet between members. Only wafers will be used (no bread, wine or grape juice) and the wafer will be placed in your hand with tongs.
- Sharing of the peace will be done standing in place without physical contact. Making appropriate signs of peace to those around you will be encouraged.
- A checklist of names of attendees will be kept in case the virus is contracted by someone in the church and contact tracing needs to be done.
- Those who wish to do so will be allowed to watch the service on the TV in the gathering area (again six-foot social distancing will be maintained).
- Sanitizer stations will be placed as necessary throughout the church.
- Finally, if you do not feel well please do not come to church. The health and well-being of all our members must always be our primary focus.

Finally, once we have ascertained when we can safely re-open, a letter will be sent to all members and announcements and updates will be put on our church website: zionsunion.org. And please be aware that when we do re-open there will surely be times of frustration, disappointment, and grief. We may make mistakes along the way. There will likely be awkward moments as

we adjust to new protocols and practices. But there will also be blessings. We will have countless opportunities to exercise the spiritual gifts of patience, kindness, gentleness, and self-control. There will be wonderful surprises, great celebrations, and moments of deep satisfaction. Let us be faithful, then—to God and to one another—as we work through the challenges of this time. Let us be guided by the Word, responsive to the Spirit, and open to the grace of God. And let us always remember that nothing can separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus!

Holy Trinity Memorial of Catasauqua

In the letter to the church in Rome, St Paul writes, "The commandments, 'You shall not commit adultery; You shall not murder; You shall not steal; You shall not covet, and any other commandment, are summed up in this word. 'Love your neighbor as yourself.' Love does no wrong to a neighbor; therefore, love is the fulfilling of the law.'" (Romans 13:9-10, NRSV). This has been the source of inspiration for Holy Trinity Memorial of Catasauqua

Over the past eleven weeks, Holy Trinity has turned God's abundant giving toward the neighborhood. The love of Christ, which is the fulfillment of the law, has freed us to

boldly live in love with this world. The call to do God's Work with Our Hands has pushed us to our sidewalk.

How are we loving this world while on our sidewalk? By trusting that God has provided and cared for us so we can walk humbly with our neighbors. God has abundantly poured over \$15,000 into a Community Help fund at Holy Trinity. We have purchased \$1,000 worth of food from restaurants and cooked \$500 worth of raw food each week for a Catasauqua food giveaway. We can't wait to see what ventures God has planned for us once the strong need for food is able to be handled by the local food bank.

Zoom Meeting with Bishop Zeiser

On Tuesday, June 9, over 160 rostered ministers and others joined Bishop Zeiser in a Zoom meeting to receive updates on several matters relating to the COVID-19 pandemic. The Bishop opened the meeting with a brief homily based on Jer. 31:15-17: Thus says the Lord: A voice is heard in Ramah, lamentation and bitter weeping. Rachel is weeping for her children; she refuses to be comforted for her children, because they are no more. Thus says the Lord: Keep your voice from weeping, and your eyes from tears; for there is a reward for your work, says the Lord: they shall come back from the land of the enemy; there is hope for your future, says the Lord: your children shall come back to their own country. The Bishop then introduced Collin Grooms, Executive Director of Bear Creek Camp. Collin announced that summer camp has been cancelled; however, family camping and a Bear Creek Camp Conservation Corps will be available. [See the camp website for more information at bearcreekcamp.org.] The Camp will face difficult financial challenges in the coming year, but Collin is confident that the Camp will continue its ministry.

The Bishop lifted up the Online Baccalaureate Service for graduates in our synod, which was put together by Sammy Kelly and the Youth, Young Adult, and Family Ministry Team. He then introduced Julia Menzo, from Lutheran Congregational Services, who spoke about the various outreach efforts underway. [See her article below.]

The Bishop also addressed the status of Assembly 2020. Because of concerns for the safety and well-being of delegates, the Assembly will not be held at Kalahari in October as previously announced. The Assembly Planning Team is considering several options, including the possibility of an online Assembly. A recommendation will be presented to the Synod Council at their meeting on July 14, and their decision will then be announced to the synod.

Finally, the Bishop addressed challenges the church will face in the weeks and months ahead. These include the role of online worship, communion practice in a time of social distancing, and the need to confront racial injustice in our land.

Spiritual and Emotional Care in the time of COVID-19

The routines of work, school and simply running errands have been disrupted by COVID-19. The rituals we practice in worship, grieving, marriage, baptism, and more have been put on pause. These disruptions can impact our emotional and spiritual health. To meet these disruptions church leaders have offered creative worship, prayer, and fellowship opportunities; many of us have developed new routines at home and for everyday life.

Lutheran Congregational Services is partnering with a number of organizations to meet needs during COVID-19. Many offer spiritual and emotional care.

Keystone Disaster Interfaith Network has established a Spiritual Care Call Line to provide appropriate and respectful disaster spiritual care to people of all ages, races, and religions, especially in the midst of COVID-19. Call 888-255-6520.
