THE PASTOR'S PAGE



One of the great tragedies of modern times is that our modern, scientific worldview has stolen away the only hope we have in this world. Ever since the rise of modern science, many of the world's leading scientists and philosophers have come to the conclusion that belief in God and life after death is a myth. Two of the greatest philosophers of the twentieth century, Bertrand Russell and Friedrich

Nietzsche, took great pride in their atheism. So, it is interesting that a deep gloom and despair pervade their writings. Nietzsche is legendary for the miserable life he lived. Russell wrote a famous essay, ironically titled, "A Free Man's Worship." In it he wrote: "Brief and powerless is Man's life; on him and all his race . . . slow, sure doom falls pitiless and dark . . . For Man, condemned to lose his dearest, tomorrow himself to pass through the gate of darkness, it remains only to cherish . . . the lofty thoughts that ennoble his little day." Such is the tone of even our noblest philosophy without the hope of resurrection.

Perhaps it is the influence of modern doubt and skepticism that has given rise to the widespread fear of death that is so prevalent today. People will go to almost any lengths to hold off having to face the reality of death: Grecian formula, hair weaves, face lifts, and tummy tucks are just a few of the things Americans spend billions of dollars on each year in a vain attempt to deny the aging process. And when our aging and our inevitable death can no longer be denied, a few wealthy people have opted to have their bodies cryogenically frozen in order to keep death at bay.

It's quite ironic that while most people today want to live a long time, few want to grow old. A well-known Lutheran preacher by the name of Edmund Steimle once wryly noted that old age, as we know it today, did not exist prior to this past century. Fifty years ago Pastor Steimle made this observation: "When those now over 65 were born, the average person worked about 70 hours a week and died at age 40. A person now works 40 hours a week and has a life expectancy of 70." Today, the average life expectancy in the U.S. is 79, and it is no longer rare for people to live past 100.

In light of all this, what can Christianity say to those who, while living longer and longer lives, must endure so much pain and suffering in their "golden" years? As we grow old our health declines and we might have to live our final days in a hospital or nursing home. And we see many of our dearest friends and loved ones pass away before us. As we enter our last days, life may begin to feel bleak, cold, and dreary.

But think about this. There is one thing that helps us to struggle through each and every winter in life. And that is the promise of spring. When

we're digging out from a snowstorm, we like to remind ourselves, "Spring is just around the corner!" What gets us through the cold, harsh winter is the certainty that spring is coming; and with it, warmth, sunshine, and *new life*. And what can get us through the often bleak winter of our lives is God's promise that a bright and glorious new life is just around the corner for us.

Sadly, modern science and atheism have stolen away this hope for many people today. But we moderns are certainly not the first skeptics. St. Paul wrote a letter to early Christians living in the city of Corinth who were having a hard time believing in life after death. To address their doubt, Paul points out the implications of Christ's resurrection:

"If Christ is proclaimed as raised from the dead, how can some of you say there is no resurrection of the dead? . . . if Christ has not been raised, then our proclamation has been in vain and your faith has been in vain . . . then those who have died in Christ have perished. If for this life only we have hoped in Christ, we are of all people most to be pitied." (1 Corinthians 15:12-18)

When you get right down to it, the single most important question we all face in life is this: Is the hope of eternal life just a wishful fantasy, or is it a genuine hope that we can cling to with all certainty? Paul addressed the doubts of the Corinthians by pointing to what was for him an absolute fact: Christ's resurrection. Paul goes on to say:

"Now I would remind you, brothers and sisters, of the good news that I proclaimed to you . . . that Christ was raised on the third day . . . and that he appeared to Cephas, then to the twelve. Then he appeared to more than five hundred brothers and sisters at one time, most of whom are still alive, though some have died. Then he appeared to James, then to all the apostles. Last of all, as to one untimely born, he appeared also to me." (1 Cor. 15: 1-6)

That is a huge number of eyewitnesses; but what is most significant for Paul is not Christ's Resurrection itself, but what its implications are for human beings. In his letter to the Romans, Paul put it this way: "If we have been united with Christ in a death like his, we will certainly be united with him in a resurrection like his" (Romans 6:5).

That is our Christian hope; our only hope in the face of death. Christ is risen!
