# THE PASTOR'S PAGE



Scripture tells us about two important gardens: the Garden of Eden and the garden in which Jesus' body was laid in a tomb after his crucifixion. At first glance, it might seem that one of the gardens marked the

beginning of life, the other the end of a life. In the long run, however, people were cast out of the Garden of Eden, while Mary Magdalene and the disciples found the garden tomb to be a place where life had been renewed.

Easter brings us new life that is eternal. The risen Christ promised it. Jesus promised that through the Holy Spirit he would never leave us. Jesus promised that the Spirit would be our comforter, our source of reassurance in difficult times, our guide and our strength. The Son of God could not be defeated and through his death, death has been defeated forever. Jesus' death was a prelude to life everlasting for him and for us.

After his death, Jesus came back to living people. The disciples experienced his comforting, uplifting presence that guided them through extremely difficult times. Eternal life for us, too, is not only hope for a life hereafter, but a hope for something that can begin now, if we are open to Christ's presence through the Holy Spirit. To be sure, evil and suffering and death still exist. All of us endure times when life's goodness is hard to find. Yet, the power of Christ's resurrection restores us. Even when we stumble and fall, or reach the point where we seem to see nothing but darkness, a hand reaches down to lift us up and a divine light shows us a way out.

The "good life" that we all strive to have will inevitably include times of accomplishment, joy and celebration; and other times when sorrow or loss will get us down. At all times, though, if we can feel and experience the power of Jesus' eternal presence with us, there is hope. According to church tradition, each and every Sunday is a "little Easter," a day of renewal, a fresh start for the new week ahead. In the good life that God has given us, God's good news comes to us again and again as we move along toward that final day when we will "dwell in the house of the Lord forever."

#### D.E.A.R.

Since spring is here, it's a good time to check or build your emergency kit for your home. We should all be prepared for sheltering in for at least 3 days in the event of an emergency. Here are some basic supplies to have in your kit.

- 1. <u>Water</u> 1 gallon per person for 3 days. Chlorine bleach + medicine dropper to disinfect water
- 2. <u>Food</u> non-perishable items that do not require heating: peanut butter, energy bars, canned meats, canned pasta, pop tarts, etc.
- 3. Battery Powered or Hand Crank NOAA weather radio
- 4. Flashlights/lanterns/headlamps
- 5. Batteries/batteries/batteries
- 6. First Aid Kit/medicines (extra supply)
- 7. Whistle to signal for help
- 8. Dust mask/plastic sheeting/duct tape to shelter in place
- 9. Moist towelettes, garbage bags & ties for personal sanitation
- 10. Wrench/pliers to turn off utilities
- 11. Manuel can opener
- 12. Cell phone with chargers and backup battery
- 13. Pet food/water
- 14. Important documents in waterproof container (personal ID, insurance policies, bank account records)
- 15. Matches in waterproof container

#### No More Sunday School?



At Holy Trinity Memorial in Catasauqua, the Christian Education Team decided to try something new. This decision was reached because the church noticed a declining trend in Sunday School attendance. With this trend, the question was asked, "What's more important: Worship or Education?" The team decided that worship is more important and that education can happen inside of a worship service if time is allowed.

If the congregation were going to worship with a group of young people, then it needed talk about what might attract them. The team made sure that parents, educators, theologians, and lay people were present in these talks. In the end, they determined that they would begin a family service during the normal Sunday School times. September would kick off this new worship format.

To be completely honest, the leaders of this new worship service were ready to revert to the traditional Sunday School programing within three months. They just did not see this service taking hold in the community. Wrong these leaders were.

Since the start, the service has grown in attendance, averaging thirty people each week. While the service is not perfect, it is filled with joy by a loving and accepting multi-generational group of people.

This was one church's answer to this question. It's not a solution for everyone. It was a discovery process. The team strongly suggests that all groups talk. Don't try just anything, which may turn out to nothing more than a gimmick. Try to discover a new way of being.
