THE PASTOR'S PAGE



Are you experiencing phone button burnout? If you've recently tried to call your insurance company, your bank, the phone company, or any other company you deal with, your call was no doubt answered by a pleasant electronic voice inviting you to spend the next hour or so

trapped in a kind of electronic purgatory pushing 1 for this, 2 for that, ad nauseum. This is the world known in the industry as IVR, which stands for "Interactive Voice Response," which is nothing more than a way for companies to make you feel like you are talking to someone without actually doing so!

Last year companies spent almost 8 billion dollars beefing up their IVR systems, placing more and more layers of menus and automated responses between themselves and their customers. In other words, many companies believe that it simply costs too much in time and personnel to spend time talking to us personally about our needs.

But now some consumer advocates are fighting back. There are now a number of websites that give you secret tricks to get to talk to a real person. One trick is to lie and say you're using a rotary phone. Another is to consistently push the "0" key to every prompt. Another is to access the Spanish-speaking line; because chances are good you will get someone who is bi-lingual. Also, every company actually has a secret code you can press to connect directly to a customer service rep, and this website lists more than 100 companies and their top-secret codes.

What these companies all forget is that when customers need something badly we want to talk directly to the person who can get it for us rather than working our way through a frustrating maze of menus. There is simply no substitute for a real live human being who will listen and respond to our needs.

Jesus' disciples often talked like the automated voices you hear when you dial up a major corporation. The disciples frequently saw themselves as a bunch of bodyguards whose function it was to keep the crowds from getting too close to Jesus. They kept the little children at bay, until Jesus reminded them that to such as these belongs the kingdom of God. They tried to keep the blind and disabled from getting too close to Jesus as well. They saw themselves as an insulating layer between the people and Christ—as though Jesus needed their protection.

The history of the Christian church too often reflects this way of thinking. The professional clergy, the institution of the church, the stained glass windows and collars and vestments and bureaucracy, often appear to be insulating factors that keep people from connecting directly with God. The question we clergy have to ask ourselves is: Do the members of our

congregation have access? Do you know that you have direct access to God? Do you understand that is it Jesus who offers you access, who serves as God's customer service agent? Do you understand that there is a menu, but it's not an automated phone menu but rather a menu of loaves and fishes, a menu in which you can hear Jesus say to you, "Ask and it shall be given you, seek and you shall find, knock and the door shall be opened to you."

Imagine that you've called your insurance company in a panic, and to your amazement a person picks up the phone, and lo and behold, it's the CEO himself wanting to help you! How would that make you feel? That's essentially what happens when we pray. Jesus provides us with direct personal contact and divine customer service.

The good news for us is that we don't have to wade through a myriad of messages and phone prompts in order to have access to Jesus. We can bring our needs directly to him through prayer, and the CEO of the universe makes a direct connection to us! As the Bible tells us, he knows what we need even before we do.

The flip side of this, though, has to do with our accessibility to others who are in need of a connection to Christ. As modern churches generate more and more programs and, in some places get larger and more high-tech, what happens when someone quietly utters a personal need or makes a call for help? Do we give automated, churchy responses like "God helps those who help themselves" (which, by the way is not in the Bible), or do we say with sincere compassion, "How can I help you?"

You could be the "real person" on the other end of the line who makes all the difference in someone's life. We serve a God who is always there for us. As God's customer service reps on earth, shouldn't we be just as accessible?

What's it like to be a Pastoral Intern in NEPA?

It is hard to believe I have been on internship with Common Ground Recovery Community for nine months already! My time with Common Ground has been a deep blessing to me and to my education. I have witnessed the presence of God in the open vulnerable sharing during our Wednesday worship, in the heartfelt reverent "thank you's" when serving communion and meals in downtown Reading and in our study of the scriptures and 12-steps. Common Ground truly is a place of radical love and where God's grace embraces our brokenness.

As part of my internship project, I invited our worshiping communities and ministry partners to reflect on these three questions: What does Common Ground mean to you? What does community mean to you? And where do you see God here and in the world? They then drew on white cotton squares that will be sewn together to make an altar cloth to fit all of our communion tables. The responses were profound and beautiful!

There are drawings of stick figures holding hands around the globe, animals peacefully living together, a place of refuge in the storm and in the desert, flowers, hearts, and crosses. There are phrases like, "Freedom, break the chains", "God is love", "We are better together", "Never give up hope because there is hope in everything", and so much more on these 33 squares!

As these squares are knit together to make one, we are reminded that God weaves all of us together in a tapestry of love to bring warmth, comfort, grace, and peace to a weary world! May we live out this good news and may it spill over into thanksgiving! (Colossians 2:2-7)



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THE WAY FORWARD

Saul, the persecutor of God's people became Paul, champion of the living Christ, after a powerful singular experience on the road to Damascus. For Silver Lake Award honoree ValerieTutson, the powerful, singular moment that Christ came alive for her was not on the road, but in the pews of her childhood church.

Valerie Tutson is a storyteller by trade and her eyes widen with joy when she tells the story of the first time she saw a performance by some of her church friends after they returned from a camp experience at Silver Lake Conference Center (SLCC), a United Church of Christ facility. She recounts that in seeing those young women - dressed in plastic garbage bags meant to represent frog costumes and singing about the plagues and pharaoh - her life was changed forever. From then on, scripture stories were not merely words on the page, but a living breathing story, one that became hers to tell with creativity and wonder. After that she attended camp as soon, and as often, as she could.

"Silver Lake has been a part of my life since I was 11 years old," Val said. "Without a doubt, Silver Lake has helped to shape the person I am in the world. It has always been a place where my life, my creative work, and my faith get explored and braided together. I tell people all over the world that all the good stuff I learned about life and caring for God's people I learned and keep learning at camp!" She has been a camper or staff member of the camp since 1977.

SLCC Executive Director, the Rev. Ryan Gackenheimer, says that even many decades after her "come to Jesus moment" in the pews of her home church, "It is difficult to be in the presence of Val and not know that God is alive and loves you to the deepest core of who you truly are."

Do you have a "road to Damascus" moment? How does it continue to inform your life to this day?
